Chapter 15: Protecting Life and Property

We are committed to ensuring the safety and security of all Ugandans and their property.

Their mandate will remain focused on protecting national sovereignty, maintaining law and order, and supporting civil authorities in times of crisis.
- **Community Policing:** Strengthening community policing initiatives to foster trust and cooperation between law enforcement agencies and the public, enabling a more proactive approach to crime prevention and resolution.
- **Border Security:** Enhancing border surveillance and control to prevent illicit cross-border activities, including smuggling, illegal trade, and the movement of hazardous materials.

- **Cybersecurity:** Investing in robust cybersecurity infrastructure and capabilities to protect critical national infrastructure, government systems, and citizens from cyber threats.
- **Counter-Terrorism:** Maintaining a strong and vigilant counter-terrorism strategy, working with regional and international partners to prevent and respond to terrorist threats.

Chapter 17: Environmental Policy Framework

17.1 Introduction: A Comprehensive Framework for Ecological Integrity

The Green Forum's Environmental Policy is a comprehensive framework for integrating principles of ecological integrity into every aspect of governance and society. It is founded on the values and principles of sustainable development, envisioning a peaceful, united, and ecologically balanced Uganda where citizens actively participate in shaping their future. This policy serves as the guiding document for all our environmental initiatives and actions.

17.2 Policy Goals and Objectives

The overarching goal of this Environmental Policy is to promote ecological integrity and environmental justice by mainstreaming sustainable principles into the policies, programs, and political activities of the Green Forum.

Our key objectives for environmental policy include:

- **Bilateral and Regional Environmental Cooperation:** Forging strong partnerships with other nations and regional blocs on transboundary environmental issues, such as shared water resources, wildlife conservation, and pollution control.
- **Knowledge Exchange and Capacity Building:** Participating in international platforms for knowledge exchange on sustainable technologies, practices, and environmental governance, and seeking technical assistance for national capacity building.

4.2.1 Incentives for Graduate and Youth Employment

To stimulate employment for fresh graduates and skilled youth, the Green Forum administration will introduce a robust incentive program for companies. This program will subsidize the basic pay of fresh graduates and skilled youth for a period of six months per beneficiary. This initiative aims to reduce the initial financial burden on employers, encouraging them to hire and provide valuable work experience to young Ugandans entering the workforce. The subsidy will be carefully managed to ensure transparency and accountability, with clear criteria for eligible companies and beneficiaries.

4.2.2 Subsidized and Mandatory Medical Insurance

Recognizing the importance of health and well-being for a productive workforce, the Green Forum will implement a policy of subsidized but mandatory medical insurance for all employed Ugandans. The government will contribute to the insurance premiums, making healthcare more accessible and affordable for workers. This mandatory scheme will ensure that all employees have access to quality medical care, reducing financial stress due to illness and promoting a healthier, more resilient workforce. The details of the subsidy structure and implementation will be developed in consultation with healthcare providers, employers, and labor unions to ensure a fair and effective system.
